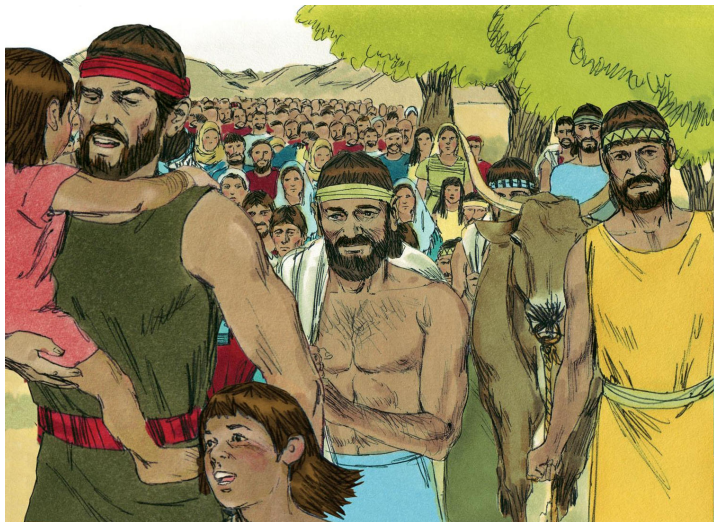
Jacob lived in Egypt for 17 years with Joseph. When Jacob died, his family carried his body to Canaan and buried him there. After some years, Joseph and all his brothers died.

Their descendants had many children and grandchildren. Jacob's descendants were called Israelites because God had changed Jacob's name to Israel. The Israelites lived in Egypt as foreigners for many years.

After many years, there was a new king in Egypt. The Egyptians called all their kings Pharaoh.

This Pharaoh did not know who Joseph was or what Joseph had done for Egypt during the years with good harvests and the years of famine.

Pharaoh was afraid because the Israelites were so numerous and powerful.

Exodus 1:9



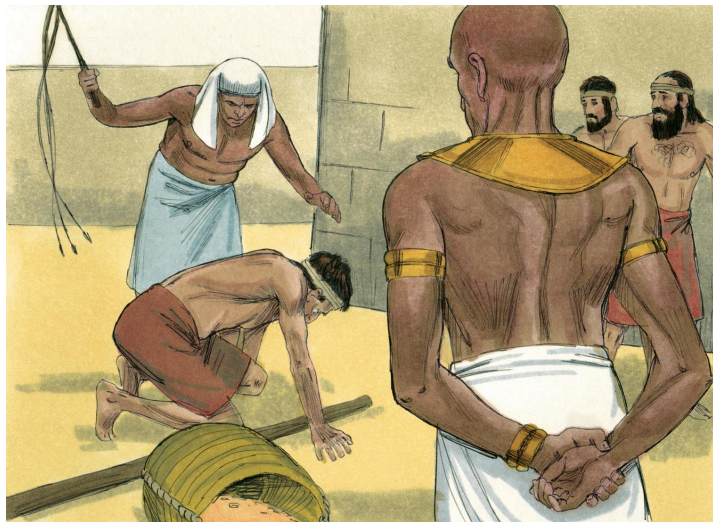
So he said to the Egyptians, “There are too many Israelites living here. They are stronger than we are. They are a threat to us!”

Exodus 1:9-10



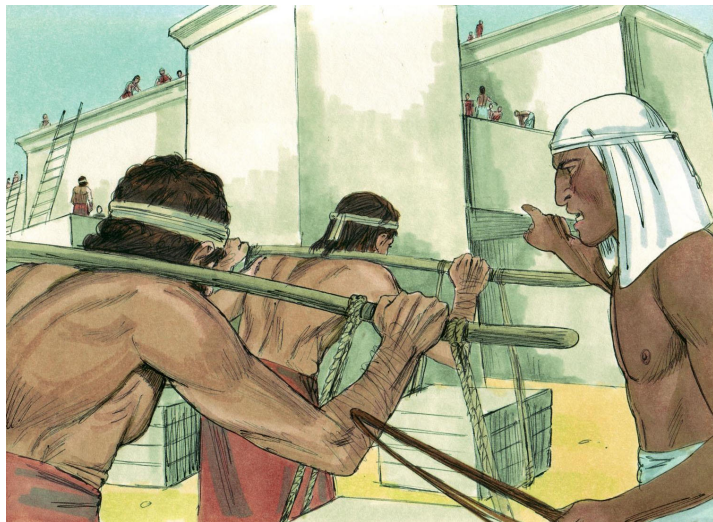
“If enemies attack us, the Israelites might help them and then leave Egypt. We must make a plan to keep them from multiplying, having more and more children!”

Exodus 1:10



So the Egyptians made the Israelites their slaves. Pharaoh appointed slave masters over them. These masters forced the Israelites to work very hard.

Exodus 1:11



Pharaoh ordered the masters, “Force the Israelites to work in the fields. Make them build new cities where we can store food.”

Exodus 1:11, 14



The slave masters oppressed the Israelites more and more, but the Israelites had more and more children. So the Egyptians became more afraid of the Israelites, who were also called Hebrews.

Exodus 1:12; (“Hebrews”: Genesis 14:13)



In those days, there were women called midwives who helped other women give birth to their babies.

Exodus 1:15



Pharaoh summoned two Hebrew midwives, Shiphrah and Puah, and said, “You must kill all the Hebrew baby boys as soon as they are born. Let only the baby girls live!”

Exodus 1:16



But the midwives feared God and did not obey Pharaoh's order. Instead, they let the baby boys live.

Exodus 1:17



When Pharaoh heard this, he sent for the midwives and said, “Why are you disobeying my order? Why are you letting the baby boys live?”

Exodus 1:18



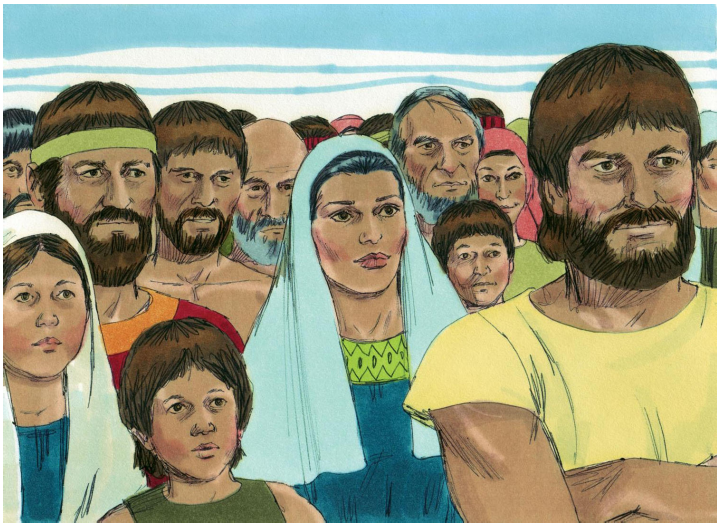
The midwives answered, “The Hebrew women are not like Egyptian women. They are very strong. They give birth to their babies before we arrive to help them.”

Because the Hebrew midwives feared God, God blessed them with children of their own.
